My junior year of college, my roommates and I decided to move off campus and rent a house. Please read Psalm 84.

What name for God is used in verse 1?

In Hebrew, *Lord of Hosts* is rendered Y@hovah Tsaba' which means *Lord of the Army. Tsaba* itself translates as: that which goes forth, army, war, warfare, go out to war, a host of angels, soldiers, service. "Evidently the meaning of the title is that all created agencies and forces are under the leadership or dominion of Yahweh, ... It is used to express Yahweh's great power."¹ The Lord of Hosts is the commander and chief of a vast army of angels and soldiers; the most powerful army in the universe and He is Almighty!

When I was little we used to sing a song about our dads that went something like "My dad's bigger than your dad, my dad's bigger than yours..." It made me feel safe to have a dad who was big enough and strong enough to take care of and protect me; how much more comforting now that I have the Lord of Hosts covering me. "J My God is bigger than your god... J"

Let's go back to Psalm 84.

Where did the Lord of Hosts dwell at this point in history (verse 1)?

How is the tabernacle described?

Why was the tabernacle lovely?

On one hand the tabernacle was lovely due to the beautiful elaborate furnishings of gold and bronze and the striking tapestry that separated the Holy of Holies from the rest of the tabernacle. The real reason for the beauty of the temple, however was that the presence of God resided there.

Please record the verbs used by the Psalmist in verse 2 to describe how he felt about the Lord of Hosts.

The NKJV uses the words *longs*, *faints* and *cries*. The meanings of these words are respectively: *to yearn most intensely*, *exhausted with desire* and *sings with joy*.

Let us ask ourselves a few questions (I'll be asking myself these same questions!):

- 1. Is your most intense desire to know Jesus and walk closely with Him?
- 2. Are you ever tired from your continued efforts to seek Him, read His word or converse with God in prayer?
- 3. Does your relationship with God bring you great joy?

If you answered *no* to any or all of these questions, don't despair—ask God to give you a heart that yearns for Him! He will be pleased to grant your request for it is His will that you love Him above all other things!

Who is able to find a home in the Tabernacle of the Lord of Hosts (verse 3)?

While we may think of commanders and generals as very tough, harsh and aggressive individuals, the Lords of Hosts has a merciful side as well. Even the sparrows and swallows were allowed to nest in the tabernacle. In the Bible, "sparrows are mentioned among the offering of the very poor."² Two sparrows were sold for a penny, and five sparrows could be bought for two pennies. The poorest little birds in nature were welcomed in the tabernacle of the Lord!

The NKJV reads: "Blessed is the man whose strength is in you, whose heart is set on *pilgrimage."* Some versions add "whose heart is set on pilgrimage to Jerusalem." The original word for *pilgrimage* used in this verse is *mecilla* which translates a highway, raised way or public road. The meaning of this verse is that we will be blessed when we seek to walk closely with the Lord of Hosts.

How, exactly, will we be blessed when we walk closely with the Lord of Hosts? The answer is in verse 6. Please fill in the missing word:

If we choose to walk with God, we will pass through the Valley of

What happens to the tears that are shed by those who are seeking God?

They water the land! The tears of the pilgrims become a "spring" and the land is refreshed. The NLT says:"When they walk through the Valley of Weeping, it will become a place of refreshing springs, where pools of blessing collect after the rains."³ After you have walked through a time of hardship and pain because you are seeking the Lord, please be aware that you will be greatly blessed by the Lord of Hosts. God promises to use all things for our good; though the road is long and rocky, we need to continue to trust Him.

What does God promise to give us when we go through the Valley of Weeping?

He says we will go from "strength to strength." One commentary translates the phrase as "*They go from strength to strength;* their company increases by the accession of more out of every town they pass through, till they become very numerous."⁴ We can be strengthened, then by asking other Christians to help us on our journey through the Valley of Weeping by joining with us in prayer.

The hardship you are facing today cannot defeat you in and of itself; you can only be defeated if you decide to quit the battle. God has supplied you with all the strength you need for this day. The original word for *strength* means strength, efficiency, ability, army, integrity, fitness.

From the above definition, please name some of the blessing we will gain after coming out of a trial (a few of my ideas are listed below):

- 1. We will become stronger in our faith. Trials often require us to develop new muscles we never knew we had.

- 3. We will discover new skills, abilities and character qualities that surface within our hearts due to times of hardship.

For the Psalmist, it was better to sit in the doorway of the temple for one day than to spend one thousand days doing anything else anywhere else; wicked or otherwise.
