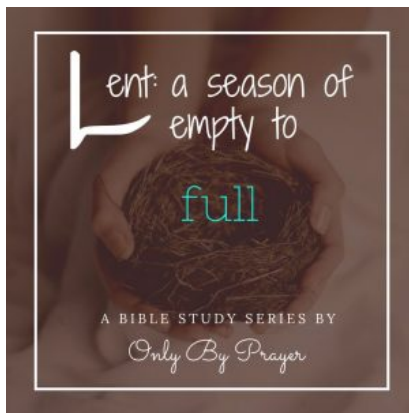


Lent: a season of empty to full, simplicity
